For the first evening of the convention, Mayor and Mrs. George E. Leach have invited the delegates to their home for a buffet supper. Many of the skiers already are acquainted with Mayor Leach, as he served as manager of the United States Olympic skiing team in 1924. The following night, December 2, a dinner open to all skiers in this vicinity will be given at the Curtis hotel. Mr. Alfred D. Lindley is local chairman of the convention.

**T**HE Moon Valley Ski club will have its first get-together of the season at the Curtis hotel Tuesday evening, when a style show of skiing togs, a display of ski equipment and movies of snow sports will be on the program. The club already has signified it will hold a costume party early in February at its club house and slides south of the city on the Shak-

opee road. Success of last year's Austrian festival, which was given national recognition in a ski publication this month, prompted the members to plan another fete for this winter.

A Thanksgiving dance will be given by the Amna Skating club Monday evening, November 27, at the arena after a session of skating. The entertainment committee arranging the affair includes Mr. and Mrs. Howard Honaker, the Misses Elise Orth and Blanche Violette and Messrs. Walter Lapher, Alfred Hulten and Harold Rosenthal.

Members of the Figure Skating Club of Minneapolis started off their year with a meeting last

week, and the board of directors will meet soon to choose officers and committee. Skating will start the first week of December at the club's rink on Portland avenue.

**D**ATES for its annual revue have been set by the St. Paul Figure Skating club for January 3 to 6 at the St. Paul auditorium. The club, headed by Miss Eileen Bigelow as president, already is practicing on the ice at the auditorium for the show, and is constructing another rink on West Seventh street to be ready for use early in December.

Of interest to winter sports fans in both cities are the dates for St. Paul's winter carnival, set for January 26 to February 4.
