

## Highland Park Group Plans Club, Ski Hill

The Highland Park plan commission will hold a public hearing Oct. 1 on a petition for a special permit which would allow construction of a 2 million dollar recreation facility, including an 18-hole golf course, ski slope, and ice skating rink, in the suburb.

Requesting the permit is the Highland Park Golf club, of which Bert Schwartz is president.

The property is east of Skokie highway between Park avenue and Half Day road and includes about 100 acres, said Newman Sheahan, city director of planning.

### Zoning Allows Golf

Sheahan said the present zoning of the site would allow construction of the golf course, but a special permit is necessary for other facilities planned. Most of the land is vacant.

Plans call for an 18-hole golf course, clubhouse, public driving range, a ski hill 200 feet high to accommodate about 1,200 skiers, a swimming pool, tennis courts, an ice skating rink, cabanas, steam room, and a public dining room, Schwartz said.

The plans also call for operation of a skeet club, toboggan slide, and ski supply shop. The facility would be called the Highland Park Golf club.

### Commission to Report

The first public hearing on the petition will be at 7:30 p. m. Oct. 1 in city hall. Sheahan said that after the public hearing, the plan commission will submit a written report to the city council on the petition with the commission's recommendations. Approval would come from the city council.

Schwartz said that if the permit is approved, construction work would start immediately. All of the work, except the ski hill, is expected to be completed by next summer.

The city would provide the fill for the ski hill, Schwartz said. This would save costs and the rest of the project would cost about 2 million dollars, he said. If approved, the ski hill would take about two years to construct, he added.
