New installations completed this year include one double chairlift, 27 rope tows, seven chalets, five new ski areas and four areas adding night skiing.

Ontario now has 115 active skiing areas plus some 15 private ski clubs with their own facilities. A total of 17 chairlifts, 68 T-bars, 22 Poma lifts, 3 J-bars and 26 areas with snow-making equipment are available this winter.

Nearly all the developments have club chalets with coffee bars and many provide such other facilities as accommodation, ski rentals, professional instruction, tobogganing, sleigh rides, skating, dancing and apres-ski entertainment.

NORTH CENTRAL ONTARIO Huntsville's Hidden Valley has

CENTRAL ONTARIO

Snowmaking equipment has been installed at Snow Valley Resorts near Barrie, also at Mansfield Skiways, Collingwood's Blue Mountain Winter Park, Georgian Peaks Resort, Owen Sound's Bay Motor Inn Village and Orangeville's Hockley Valley.

Chairlifts will be operating at Blue Mountain, Talisman, Bay Motor Inn and Georgian Peaks, with T-bars at Mansfield Skiways, Mount St. Louis, Snow Valley, Horseshoe Valley, Alpine Ski Club, Blue Mountain, Craigleith, Beaver Valley, Talisman, Old Smoky, Cedar Springs, Twin Hearths, Valley Schuss, Bay Motor Inn and Georgian Peaks.

A little farther afield to the southeast, Camp Fortune Ski Area north of Ottawa will open the season with a double chairlift, two T-bars, two Pomas, a J-bar and snowmaking equipment.

Woodstock Ski Club has added equipment rentals. The new Corwhin Ski Slopes is under development eight miles southeast of Guelph.

TORONTO AREA

The new Palisades Country Club will open five miles east of Uxbridge with a rope tow, club chalet, dining room and facilities for tobogganing and skating.

Nine ski areas have snowmaking equipment ready, including Cedar Springs at Burlington, Chedoke Winter Park at Hamilton, Honey Pot Ski Valley at Maple, Glen Eden Ski Club at Milton, Oshawa Ski Club, Bethany Ski Club and, in Metro area, at Don Valley, Forest Valley and Rouge Valley.

T-Bars will be in use at Bethany, Cedar Springs, Chedoke, Honey Pot, Oshawa, Rouge Valley, Devil's Elbow and Poma lifts at Honey Pot and Don Valley.

NORTHERN ONTARIO

T-bars are operating at Sault Ste. Marie's Buttermilk Hill and Searchmont Valley; also at Sudbury's Nordic Hills, Timmins Kamiskotia Mountain, Virginiatown's Raven Mountain and the Kirkland Lake, North Bay and Onaping Ski Clubs.

Haileybury's St. Bernard Ski Village, the Sault Ski Club and Searchmont Valley have Poma lifts.

An additional rope tow has been installed at the Elliot Lake and Espanola Ski Clubs. A new ski club with two rope tows and chalet has opened at Azilda near Sudbury, and at Wawa the new Mount Wawa Ski Resort has installed a double chairlift and chalet.
