

Toronto Star Ski Report

You folks with skis will get your chance to try them out this week-end—but you'll have to travel.

Although there is snow forecast for the Toronto area during the next day or so, it hasn't arrived yet. And to try out the skis, you'll have to go either north or east.

There's plenty of the white stuff around the Collingwood, Huntsville and Cobourg areas. In many of those places this early snowfall has caught the resort operators with their tows down. The ski tows at several of the better ski spots will not be operating this week-end although there is plenty of snow.

This early start for the ski season—if it lasts—will give the skiing fraternity extra chances to get into practice before the racing season officially opens hereabouts with the Ontario junior and invitation meet at Huntsville's Limberlost Inn, Jan. 15 and 16.

Here's the latest skiing information available for The Star's ski report. This report will appear every Friday and Saturday.

Cobourg—Skiing for the past three weeks. Six inches of hard-packed snow with conditions fair to good. One tow operating.

Huntsville (Limberlost)—Eight inches of snow but no tow till next week-end. Conditions poor to fair.

Barrie (Midhurst)—No ski'g, snow is patchy.

Bracebridge — Two inches of snow, but no skiing.

Kitchener — Just traces of snow, no skiing.

Markdale—Snow only patchy, no skiing.

Sundridge—Four to five inches of snow, but no skiing yet and no tow operating.

Peterborough (Bethany) — No skiing. Snow washed away by rain.

Bolton — No skiing, snow patchy.

Claremont — Conditions poor. One to three inches of snow.

Collingwood (Blue Mountains) — Conditions fair. Four to six inches of snow, one tow operating. Skiing fair to good on the "Apple Bowl."

Haileybury—No skiing.

Newmarket — Less than one inch of snow, no skiing.

Newmarket—Only half-inch of snow, no skiing.

Midland—Four inches of snow, but conditions poor. Jump not yet in operation and no tows operating.
